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Key Takeaways Student Speaker Perspective

It was a privilege to present "From Agenda Item to Impact" at the NStEP National Student Engagement Network event in Maynooth University. My session focused on how student leadership can transform engagement culture at faculty level by embedding student voice as a recurring, actionable agenda item across schools.

This work emerged in response to post-pandemic engagement data—internal feedback scores revealed a breakdown in engagement, especially among placement-heavy and commuter students. As Student Faculty Representative for the Faculty of Science and Health at DCU, I led a cross-faculty proposal to institutionalise student engagement on school teaching meeting agendas. The proposal was formally adopted across seven schools and set out a series of targeted recommendations to improve engagement.

While I piloted a faculty-wide inter-year coffee morning during Week 3, the proposal also recommended redesigned consultation practices to improve accessibility and the introduction of a structured peer mentorship system using a long-term 'grandparent' model. One of the most impactful steps was a focused consultation with nursing students—the Nurses' Focus Group—on 25-week placements, which gave voice to those often excluded from typical engagement channels.

Presenting this journey at the NStEP event and hearing from so many others doing transformative work across institutions was both energising and affirming. The feedback from attendees—staff and students alike—reinforced the importance of simple but meaningful interventions and of embedding engagement into governance structures, not just projects.

It was a real pleasure to attend NStEP's most recent network event at Maynooth University on what proved to be a beautifully sunny day in May. As always, the event brought together a thoughtful, passionate group of students and staff committed to advancing student engagement and partnership across Irish higher education.

The theme "From Participation to Partnership" was powerfully reflected in the day's programme. Two sessions in particular stood out for me. First, "From Agenda Item to Impact" delivered by Alex Candon (DCU). Alex offered a clear and honest account of what it takes to rebuild engagement culture postpandemic. His experience as Faculty Rep and involvement in quality assurance demonstrated how student leadership, when supported, can drive meaningful change.

The second standout was "Voices at the Table" from Eddie Corr and Emma McDermott (Maynooth University). Eddie's energy and skill as a presenter were matched by a deep understanding of student success and belonging. Together with Emma's perspective from the frontline of student support, they reminded us of the importance of equipping students to learn how to navigate university, not just academically, but as full members of the community.

Events like this reaffirm that true student engagement goes far beyond consultation. It's about partnership, shared responsibility, and a willingness to co-create better learning environments for all.
